Board-a-match

Monday, noon

We continue our festival with another team event, board-a-match.

Board-a-match is a type of scoring where one could say that it is a team tournament scored like pairs. You compare your scores only with your teammates, but regardless of the difference in points you can only gain 2VP on every board. So on every board you can win the board (2VPs), tie the board (1VP) or lose the board (0VPs). Imagine you are playing pairs tournament on only 2 tables, so be alert and don't let any tricks disappear.

Last year we had 48 teams, and and this year we have 57 registered teams, so it seems that although we have over 500 participants at the festival, half of them enjoy sun and sea and took some break from playing cards:). We are starting as all teams tournament at noon, and at BAM we will have short break from about 4 p.m to 5 p.m.

Couple of more reminders:

For all the tournaments you will pay at the table. Please prepare exact amount of money.

You are responsible for entering the correct result into BridgeMate. If you, however, somehow miss-score, there is only very short time available to make corrections: one hour after the tournament. We cannot accept later complains so please, just check the result after every board. Soon after the tournament unofficial results will be published and you will have one hour to report an error. You have to do it by sending email to pulabridge@gmail.com.

Once you have registered, there is nothing much you should do before the tournament except arrive to the playing room 15 minutes before the start (11.45 a.m. for this tournament) and find your table. Positions will be displayed online one hour before the start (11 a.m.), again, at pulabridgefestival.com.

We will play 7 rounds, 6 hands per round. One round is 50 minutes and there is a small break between rounds.

It is the best to leave your mobile phone in your room, but if you take it with you it should be shut down, and left in an visible place near you. Be warned that having a mobile phone that is not openly displayed at the table is illegal, and so is looking at it at any point. Tournament directors will not be happy if they see you looking at your phone, and it could again cost you, guess what: VPs. If there is a real need for you to use a phone during the tournament you should ask TD and he/she will help.

We encourage you strongly to be friendly towards your partner, opponents, officials, bartenders and all other beings you encounter. Remember how lucky we all are that we can be all together here again and for a week worry only about IMPs and MPs.



Entries/Prizes

The entries are 25 euro/play/day for all main events. (e.g. BAM teams 100 euro per team, Mixed pairs 25 euro per player, and Open teams 200 euro/team since it is a 2-3 day event). Interview: Matko Ferenca & Filip Katušić

In this issue of **Good morning bridge**, we bring you an exclusive interview with Matko and Srfić, Croatia's most decorated players, who have just won another silver medal at the World Youth Championship.

Another medal! This time at the Open Transnational World Championship, playing alongside Selena Pepić and Jovana Zoranović, Serbian national team players. Congratulations.

So, guys, how does it feel to rack up medals? How did you decide to play with the girls? Did you expect a medal? Who came up with the catchy team name. ZG-HC?

Srfić: It feels great, validating all the hard work and time invested. The idea came around Tedeschi; the girls suggested we play together. And the rest is history. I wouldn't say I expected it, but I knew we could certainly get a medal, and it would come down to whether we all played well in the end. The name was my idea, but my ideas often get "borrowed" here and there, so we'll see what others say:)

Matko: Thank you to everyone for the congratulations. It's definitely a great feeling to win medals repeatedly, and after two silvers, I hope the next one will be gold. After Filip and I agreed to play as a pair, the girls asked if we would form a team with them. All the other Croatian juniors firmly said they couldn't attend the championship, so we agreed to play with the girls. We didn't expect a medal—it's hard to expect one, and the competition was much stronger than last year—but we secretly hoped for one.

What were the strongest aspects of this team? How do you compare yourselves to the others? Did you have any specific strategy?

Srfić: Our strongest point was that we've all been friends for years. Even when things went wrong, the atmosphere was always good and lighthearted.

Matko: There wasn't any special strategy, just to calmly play each match to the best of our ability without trying to recover from bad results. Our team's strength was that the opponents didn't know what to expect from us.

The first day was, to put it mildly, a mini-disaster. I think you're among the few players who manage to recover after such a fiasco. Tell us the secret or at

least comment on where you find the strength to climb from the bottom?

Srfić: Yeah, Matko and I played like cows on the first day. Sometimes good, sometimes maybe not. We just play our game and see what happens. There's no pressure. Again, the key is the great atmosphere among us. Matko told me I was in my element, and I took that as a compliment.

Matko: After the first day, with half the matches played, we were solidly in 15th place (out of 16 teams). The second day, we played like nothing had happened. Even after losing another match on day two, three rounds before the end, we were 13th, and everyone thought we had no chance (for the top four). But we just needed to play the remaining matches calmly, without swinging. So, I'd say the secret is to play "normally," without swinging or trying to recover, because that never works.

The last two matches were phenomenal! Were the four teams in the finals really the strongest teams at the championship? How strong is the U31 competition?

Srfić: I'm not sure if I'd say they were the strongest teams at the tournament. A team with players like Donati, Kaplan, Zibi, and Bakke must be among the top four teams. I also think it would have been harder for me to play against Ante and Bibi (as was evident in the pair event). Overall, I'd say the level of play in the final was very high. I think the competition was surprisingly strong, definitely stronger compared to last year in Eindhoven.

Matko: It's hard to say if those four teams in the final were really the strongest. Judging by the players' names, they weren't, but again, the results speak for themselves. Still, the competition in the U31 category is definitely tougher than in previous years.

Medals inevitably bring fame and popularity. How do you handle that? Do you feel an increase in the number of fans? How do your non-bridge friends react to your successes?

Srfić: My friends are very proud of me. Until now, they didn't have a Paralympian in the group, and now they feel proud. I'd say my fan base is growing. Now, whenever we go somewhere, everyone asks when I'm playing so they can have a good excuse not to work.

Matko: It's not easy, but I manage:) Since winning the last medal, I've gained 1 (one) new follower on Bridgewinners, and 2 (two) on Instagram. So, you could say I'm slowly but surely stepping into the world of micro-influencers. My non-bridge friends mostly don't react to the success.



For the readers of Štih, tell us about your romantic status. What's the way to your hearts? Do you have any crushes among domestic or foreign players?

Srfić: The paths of the heart are mysterious.

Matko: Recently single, no crushes among domestic or foreign players. All offers are welcome in my inbox.

What are your thoughts on professional bridge? Should it be supported, is it the right path for developing and popularizing the game? Have you ever considered going professional, and why?

Srfić: I can't imagine myself as a professional bridge player. I love the game, but as a hobby. I feel I

wouldn't be able to play the way I love and in the way I think I'm good. Besides, I'm not the type of person who can maintain concentration and motivation for weeks at such a high level, as happened in the pair event. I think professional bridge has an important place in popularization, but it should somehow modernize to be more interesting to modern generations.

Matko: I'm not a big fan of professional bridge. I doubt it's the right path for the development of bridge, and it's certainly not the right way to popularize it. I can't say I haven't thought about going professional, but it never happened.

What do you think about various bridge-in-schools projects? When is the ideal time to learn bridge? What advice would you give to a young person who has just finished a course to make their first steps as painless as possible?

Srfić: It's hard for me to answer this question. I come from a family where both of my parents play bridge. From my perspective, I can say that college was definitely the right time to slowly enter this world. I think high school is also a good time, but probably more through mini-bridge. Of course, there will always be people who really dive into it, and with them, you can do more. In my opinion, the biggest problem with bridge is the extremely steep learning curve at the beginning. It takes almost everyone a long time to learn the basics. My recommendation would be not to worry about results at the start, but to have fun. If they listen to what others are saying, the results will come in time. You just need to be patient.

Matko: Any projects for bridge in schools are commendable. I think the ideal time to learn bridge is in high school or at the beginning of college. Of course, it would be great if elementary school kids learned bridge, but I think it's hard to keep them engaged with the game for a long time. My advice to young players is not to focus on results because it takes time for everything to fall into place. The important thing is to have fun and listen to the advice of more experienced/better players, but of course, you also need to know whom to listen to.


Interview: Matko Ferenca & Filip Katušić

What are your plans for the future? Which tournaments will you attend in the next season, and in which partnerships and teams do you plan to play? What are your goals?

Srfić: The next season is still far off. On Mondays, we'll play Holo Bolo and Terrorist NT with Toni. I'll probably continue playing pairs tournaments with Matko. Of course, there will be tournaments with Srfa, like the Cup and pairs in Pula, and random other tournaments with other dear people. Who knows, maybe Meštar will survive another Wednesday with a lack of points with me. As for tournaments, the highlight will definitely be the World Bridge Games in Buenos Aires with Matko. We'll probably continue to attend many local tournaments, like Sarajevo, Vienna, Novi Sad... As for goals, I'd like us to make it to the final in Argentina. Then, may luck be with everyone. Apart from that, I'll try not to annoy my partners too much when I surprisingly don't have my bid and when I'm consistently short on points.

Matko: I don't have any plans for the future yet. For now, it seems that the partnerships will remain the same. The only tournament I'm currently planning is the World Bridge Games in Argentina with Filip, and it will be our first pairs tournament in the Open category at the European or world level. It's hard to talk about specific goals, but I'd like to start by making it to the final session.





"PRE-EMPTS WORK !!!" -- AN EXCLUSIVE NEW "GONZO JOURNALISM" SERIES FOR PULA'S GM BRID-

The title of this article -- and of the Festival-long series it hereby initiates – is one of the more widely encountered mantras in the colorful Bazaar Of Bridge Ideas enriching our New Millenium. We find it rampant, for example, in journalistic contexts such as bidding-panel features - especially the "Master Solvers Club" (MSC) in the venerable US "Bridge World". One of the MSC Directors/Moderators is the eminent theorist and analyst Kit Woolsey, who is veritable High Priest and Chief Propagandist for the "Pre-empts Work" sound-bite dogma. This catchy slogan is however also very commonly overheard in routine dialogue between partners - often in aggrieved post-mortems where it is mournfully intoned in hopes it might acquit one or both players of culpability, but also in constructive exchanges about systemic/stylistic preferences. You have probably even uttered it yourself at least once, and if not you have heard it said, and likely accepted it as Received Wisdom - aye, of the Sages and schnooks alike. This series will take a penetrating but also quite eclectic look at the efficacy of pre-empts, with a dual goal of: (i) Entertainment; (ii) Advancing the quality of public discourse regarding this critical area of bridge theory and practice. In the latter vein, there are so many questions that beg to be asked when someone piously proffers the catechistic credo "Pre -empts Work".... Like: "What does it even mean? What, then, ALL of them? All the time? In all conditions? Against anybody? Are there not some kinds that much more STRONGLY tend to work than others?" Surely the ultra-laconic form of this cliche is not intended literally as a universal assertion.... OK but then of what PRACTICAL use is this unqualified generalization, if it fails to distinguish TYPES of cases and give us guidance for doing EFFECTIVE TRIAGE among the myriad of possible hands that a filter-less mind might consider appropriate for a preempt?

The installments in this series will consider a variety of TYPES of pre-empts, in the broadest sense of that term, but also PHILOSOPHIES of pre-emption. There will be detailed attention to empirical data -- DESPITE the inherent difficulties in arriving at confident assessments of "Did This Pre-Empt Work?", given that table results are at best an unreliable criterion for answering that question. Mostly, though, the primary objective here is to AMUSE this rather arid "preamble-to-the-series" notwithstanding. To add savor to the deals presented along the way, and to factor out certain variables that otherwise could threaten to over-complicate the analytical pic-



ture, you are assured right at the outset that the dramatis personae in all cases involve Gold, Silver, and Bronze medalists at the WBF and/or EBL levels.


All boards are recent too -- from major competitions held since Pula 2023. So without further ado
Our first deal actually features pre-emptive action by BOTH members of a partnership, in a prestigious MP event at a NABC. On this occasion I was playing with a good friend, eminent colleague and proper world-class player, but regrettably not a regular partner. As in many instances throughout this series, identities may be suppressed for reasons of professional integrity, courtesy, personal affection, and of course last but not least ... self-preservation. As early as Board #1, I picked up the following hand in second chair at Love All: ♠76 ▼KQ1095 ◆A ♣109876.

RHO opened 1•, whereupon I jumped obstructively to 2•. Most would make a simple overcall, but in my estimation 2• rates to be tactically much more effective. They have the ranking Major AND Minor, and with an opening bid on my right and my limited values it seemed the enemy were big favorites to outbid us. Most partnerships (at least at NABCs) can distinguish as Responder between 4-card spade length and a holding of 5+ cards at the ONE-level – but this can easily prove tricky one stratum higher.

In particular, whenever LHO has five spades in a mediocre hand, 5/3 spade fits can often just get lost

LHO doubles 2♥, and now when Opener has less than 4 of them The Good Ship Spades will usually have sailed.

We will now show the full deal, and display the rest of the auction – and eventually examine the play:



No doubt some (most? all?) readers also regard AT LEAST one of the calls chosen by Responder here as how you say in English? polite English, I mean ... "open to question". To be fair, on the first round he had reason to seek a possible spade fit, and be concerned about a possible slam (even at MPs), and worry that defending 2VX – that is, IF partner would re-open with X – may not compensate them even for a NV game.

On the next round, however, 3NT would be a standout for many – and if that is deemed inadequate perhaps a natural 4NT would appeal...though perhaps there was justifiable concern that 4NT could be misinterpreted.

In any case, 3♥ risked sailing right past the likely par contract, carried further dangers of possibly implying interest in diamonds, and to make matters worse a subsequent 4NT -- e.g. over 4♦ -- would be EVEN MORE likely to be construed as conventional. In my view it is not unfair to say that S was not coping all that well

with the situation -- and of course there was still more to come, since they were now perched in a cue-bid.

Fortunately for S, his partner – bless his butt -- now providentially made the one call that still kept the door open to 3NT. Indeed, over 3. the third-round rebid of 3NT caters fairly well to everything S could reasonably hope to cover: if partner thinks that he is being offered a choice between 3NT and a 4/3 spade game, that is just fine – and even if he thinks S is trying to show uncertainty about NT with a suitable hand for diamonds, S is fully prepared to disillusion partner about that unwanted latter interpretation by bidding 4NT over any further action by Dealer. (This should NOT be conventional when the ostensible Choice-Of-Games cue-bid is not followed up with a 4 cue-bid over 4 -- especially in a context that may already be rather murky.)

Now however S judged that a 4/3 spade game would be superior to 3NT, no doubt envisioning a crossruff -- even though the transparent auction would make it clear to EW that they were defending a Moysian fit.

As is evident, NS make at least ten tricks in NT, so even if 4♠ comes home – as it does double-dummy, and did at my table – it rates to be a poor NS score. So what is your verdict: did this PRE-EMPT WORK?

It would seem so – if instead E overcalls a sedate 1♥, the auction would almost surely subside at 3NT. By the way, we need to be clear-headed in trying to assess the efficacy of a given pre-empt, in that the result achieved at the table may yield an extremely misleading impression in that regard. For example imagine a field where the majority of N players El-THER: (1) open a weak 2 on that hand (yes it gives me the willies too, but such competitors do abound); OR ELSE (2) they pass as Dealer. In either case, numerous pairs might miss game, or wind up in 5♦, so that -420 could be a mediocre score -- or even worse -- for the pre-empting side. This is irrelevant however – we have to try to judge ONLY within the frame of OUR OWN TABLE, the only place where our choices can exert any influence on the outcome.

So our MP score – or in another context, the number of IMPs gained or lost – should not be decisive. (What can matter, though, is whether or not an alternative action would have been MORE profitable.) This domain abounds with : "The operation was successful – but the patient died." And the converse. Alert readers will – at this point, if they haven't done so already – be thinking: "Wait a minute, Gonzo. You skipped right over the play of the hand. Moreover, way back at the start you said BOTH partners had pre-empted? Exactly where amongst those chronic passes by W do you hallucinate a preempt?"

Well spotted Lords and Ladies, and that brings us to the next portion of our narrative – but first let me remind you of two things. First, I clearly stated that this series would eclectically cover many different KINDS of pre-empts. Second, I never said that on this deal both partners pre-empted IN THE BID-DING.

In order to de-mystify these coy and cryptic teases, we must now have a look at the play and defense. I looked no further than ♥K for my opening lead, and this was won in dummy. Three rounds of clubs followed, declarer discarding his heart loser. I rather expected dummy's lone diamond to be advanced at this point (which is in fact the winning move). Instead however he led a heart, doubtless to prevent an early diamond discard – ironically that is the best defense now anyway. Anyway, this sent W into a long studious trance – and when partner eventually emerged from his ruminative time-out, imagine my surprise when he learnedly ruffed in ... with the DEUCE. As you might have surmised, this card did not hold the trick -- declarer overruffed it with the four. (Actually when W finally put a black card on the table, declarer – who was expecting partner to ruff with a mid-to-high pip -- had already detached the spade Ace from his hand. Unluckily for us, he selfishly noticed just in time that W had inserted the smallest trump in the clan, and hastily withdrew his Ace to replace it with a pawn.) There were a few more twists and turns - quite interesting in and of themselves, actually, but of at most only secondary relevance here – nevertheless it was not long before declarer had ten merry tricks pointed his way. I think all will agree that while -420 might prove a satisfactory EW result on the deal, the pre-empt would be even more handsomely rewarded with a plus score against the opposing game. After the futile sacrifice of ♠2, this did not happen. In fact from an analytical perspective this is a fascinating deal as regards whether 4 can or should make. The short answer is Yes It Is Cold (at doubledummy, anyway), and the short answer is all you lot are going to get here. There are far too many variations to sift through, and while some of the themes and contortions are quite picturesque, THIS article is not about card-play analysis - it is about preempts. So by all means run off on your own and explore the labyrinth of possibilities surrounding this 4♠.

For the moment, though, you should instead be whining: "Just hold on there, Gonzo, WE STILL DON'T SEE ANY SECOND PRE-EMPT." Hang in there Grasshoppers — your patience will soon be rewarded. But first, of course, I must explain how the loo fits into all this.

When many folks -- especially those with a Y chromosome – reach the after-prime of their lives, they typically exhibit a marked uptick in their personal

traffic patterns to -- and ideally from -- the lavatory. Despite lifelong nonconformism, your correspondent is no exception. The featured deal having been Board 1 of the event, I subsequently had occasion throughout the afternoon and evening to excuse myself gracefully from the playing area too many times to count (and such computation is probably not a thing anyway). The point here is that virtually EVERY time that I navigated the return journey, where do I find my partner but TELLING SOMEONE NEW OF HIS RUFF WITH THE DEUCE FROM •JT92.

Seriously? What on earth was up with that? My first thought was that only a masochist would EVER self-flagellate by going out of his way to publicly broadcast this ignominious gaffe – but 'masochist' was not really a jacket that could ever fit this alpha compadre. THEN my friends, it hit me – and how it turned my blood cold, and punctured my sensitive heart What if he were telling all and sundry of this blot on his escutcheon TO HEAD ME OFF AT THE PASS, to spread the story before I had a chance?

How sorrowful that he could ever think I would do such a thing – OF COURSE it would never enter my mind to squeal on his momentary blackout, just as I would trust him to take my secrets to the grave. I'd never be spilling it now, except he already did. So you be the judge – DID HIS PRE-EMPT WORK?

Restaurant Boschetto

Very nice, friendly place near the tennis courts, 500 meters from the venue. Decent food and reasonable prices. This restaurant will probably host us for Madhatter's Karaoke Party. They will stay open every day until there are guests (2 a.m.). So this is the place to go after the tournaments for dinner or drinks. Most of other places around close at 11 or 12.

Restaurant Yacht Club

Only about 100 meters from the venue, down on the sea shore, one of Croatia best fish restaurants with breath-taking views. During the day you can also have a snack or just a cocktail and enjoy.

Reasonably priced for a restaurant of this level. For a bigger groups (especially in the evenings), booking is recommended.





Restaurant Kuglana

The closest restaurant to the venue, maybe 50 meters, between Histria and Park Plaza Verudela, right across the Histria Wing hotel. Lot of various dishes, from as simple as ham and eggs and pizza to Istrian and Croatian specialities. It is not expensive and you can get a decent dish for 15-20 euro. They usually do not take bookings as it is always crowded anyway. They also serve breakfast.

Ribarska koliba

This is a famous fish restaurant about 20 minutes walk from the venue, in marina. You can see Ribarska koliba from windows of the main playing room. It is rather expensive and booking is usually required. Michelin Guide's Point Of View: This restaurant in the Ribarska Koliba Resort is situated near the Marina Veruda which can be admired through the large picture windows or from the restaurant's attractive terrace. Delicious Mediterranean cuisine takes pride of place on the menu, ranging from pasta-based starters to fish and seafood dishes made from the freshest ingredients, although a few meat-based specialities also feature.

Konoba Volme

This place is a bit further away, in Banjole, but it is worth visiting. It is a very nice restaurant with big terrace, very local and homey. Food is authentic Croatian, delicious and prices are in a lower range. You will need a car to get there. To make sure you get your table make a reservation +385 (98) 818265.



Restaurant Batelina (Gaultmillau review)

Restaurant Batelina is actually an old tavern in Banjole, a small town near Pula. It is not particu-



larly decorated, nor does it have any advantages such as a garden, a special view or an interesting interior design, yet it is incredibly popular and it is very difficult to get a reservation. The first reason is the always fresh fish and seafood, but also the reduced working hours. An additional reason is certainly their famous chef David Skoko, a cook that appears almost every day on TV. Although he does not cook at Batelina on a daily basis, he is the one who creates the menu. The appetizers are varied and they serve 6 or 7 of them in small bowls or little plates: marinated sardines, sardines in savor (fried and marinated), sea bass ceviche, pickled vegetables, salads... Our favourite was the gran-

cigula, a delicious crab that is harder to find in restaurants these days. All dishes are based on a traditional and simple method of preparation. First of all, there are raw or grilled scampi, as well as various fish, depending on the day's catch, but also traditional cuttlefish brodetto, squid noodles with fried onions, which are definitely to recommend. If you expect top-quality dishes, prepared with imaginative culinary techniques, paired with wines, and all this in an elegant space – well, you won't find it here. Rather, we would say that Batelina is a tavern of "raw passions", basic, simple and traditional. Important notice: in Batelina they don't accept credit cards.


Sophia, Grand Hotel Brioni

Sophia restaurant is a premium meat specialist. Dine on the highest quality matured cuts of beef, including favourites like classic American steaks, but also local like Istrian Boskarin.

The atmosphere of this restaurant quickly puts a spell on their guests. Subdued lighting and darker color scheme create a mood that invites them to lower their guard and simply let the restaurant's specialties sweep them away. Expensive, but worth it.

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
