Please arrive to the playing room 15 min utes before the start and find your table. Positions will be displaye online one hour before the start at <u>pulabridgefestival.com</u>



Match report: Mixed teams round 6



Before last round in first place was Netherladns/ Slovenia team Palačinka with 4VP lead in front of second team Croatian Staničić software. Also in the hunt for the gold was third place team Mixed Snics with rest of the field at least half a match behind wiining three.

After first board which was a push in 44, although defence had some chances to set a game), second board brought some early fireworks.



Interview: Sofie Sjødal

What brings you to Pula?

It's a fun tournament to play with friends, especially because you can switch around a lot.

How do you choose your partners for mix tournaments?

I usually ask some of the best players that I think are available, and then I work my way down the list, but I still haven't gotten further than my first choice.

What is the most important thing you request from your partner and what is your own best bridge feature?

The most important thing in a partner is res-

pect. Which is something I think I'm good at giving. I like to believe that I'm good at keeping calm at the table and be nice to my partners so



they preform their best.

What do you do when you don't play bridge, what are your interests and passions? I play a lot of bridge, so not time for much else, but I am partly studying to become a teacher, and I also work in the Norwegian bridge federation with teaching and communication. And if I'm at home I love to sit on the couch and watch Netflix.

When and how did you start to play bridge? What would you recommend to those who are just starting?

I started when I was 8 because both my parents play, and I was tired of them talking about something I didn't understand. To new players I would recommend to just play a lot, have fun with the game. Don't focus too much on learning new conventions, natural bidding gets you far enough and taking tricks is more important.



What type of scoring do you prefer? Why? I prefer teams with imps, both because I like having teammates, but also because I find it really interesting to look for the beating trick as defenders


Do you prefer hats or boots, why? Difficult question, I don't normally wear either, but it is probably boots, I think very high boots is cool

I lead the •7 to the ace, and my partner with her three aces was worried we wouldn't have more tricks, so she quickly underled the ace of hearts and the opponents didn't think she had the guts to do that, so they played low, giving me a trick on the jack, and afterwards we got our two major aces for -1 and a win board in the BAM

The lead was ♥5 to the jack and ace. Club to the king and ace, two rounds of hearts and he ruffs with the ♣J and plays ♠A and diamond. Now I played a club and she put the 5, so I put the 6 and claimed the rest. It's not so often I take a finesse to the 6.



A-LEAGUE OF THEIR OWN -- "Using stumbling blocks as steppingstones / Or anything that'll work


Welcome to the third instalment of our Gonzo Journalism series about BICWAYTANA (Bridge In Croatia When All You Tourists Are Not Around). In the first article we kibitzed Renata Muller as she executed a simultaneous double-threatened-throwin, and in the second one a squeeze-endplay, both in our A-Liga. Today she flexes her prowess further, in a technical terrain well described by the lines that comprise the above subtitle of our episode (from a poignant ballad by the great Guy Clark, called "Comfort & Crazy").

This third vignette in our series will be more interactive than the first two -- it invites you to engage with the featured deal directly by making two fateful choices, one in the auction and one in the play. Early on in a 16-board IMP match with all vulnerable, you hold as Dealer: ♠85 ♥J2 ♠KQ9753 ♣Q98. You are playing 2 ♠ as natural and weak, so the first question is Do-You-Or-Don't-You? Vulnerable with a balanced hand and a decent but iffy suit, some would view 2 ♠ as marginal/borderline -- but probably most of us would bid, if for no other reason than the Credo: "IF we are playing a weak 2 ♠ opening, it is a good tactical policy to use it whenever there is a reasonable excuse to do so". Do we veto the Credo, or do we two diamonds?

In fact, the player at the table did open -- but if you preferred Pass your ballot was not in vain, as we will return to such parallel universes later. Meanwhile you will next be asked to cast another vote as soon as the auction is over − and that won't take long, as it was very simple from here. "Your" 2 ◆ opener gets passed around to RHO (our protagonist Renata) who reopens with a jump to 3 ▼. Your LHO (hi that's me) raises to 4 ▼, which closes proceedings. SO now you get to lead. Unlike live bridge, reading this article is not a timed event, so don't feel rushed -- ponder at leisure and make a thoughtful choice. OK right then that's enough, NOW you can feel rushed -- Mesdames et Messieurs, les jeux sont faits, rien ne va plus.

The full deal is shown next, and an attentive examination of the layout will enable you to see how you fared with your chosen lead, before we continue with our narrative of what happened at the table:

WEST	North	EAST	South
2♦	pass	pass	3♥
pass	4♥	all pass	



As you can readily see, the friendly heart break gives S nine tricks, and a tenth could potentially be taken either by S-K or else in the diamond suit. Therefore a successful defense will have to nullify both of these NS resources. A survey of the defensive prospects after a lead in each of the four suits goes as follows:


- 1) DIAMOND K (or else Q) Good news!! There will be no suspense or long drawn-out play to wear you down. Bad news!! You've just created Trick #10. Secret pro tip for such situations: Pray for a flat board.
- 2) HEART Declarer draws all the EW trumps. Now she advances ♠Q, which East must immediately win to block the suit, AND must shift to his diamond to knock ♦A out of dummy before it affords access to ♠K. That does indeed address all defensive goals EXCEPT that when East leads his diamond and declarer's big card is duly covered by West, dummy just plays low and then the defense has no way to stop a tenth trick. Declarer will either score a second diamond, or else be able to throw one of her minor-suit losers on ♠K.
- 3) CLUB Good news!! This builds a trick in the suit, which can be cashed when defenders get in again. Bad news!! This makes no difference, because once again South is able to draw the enemy trumps and then present ♠Q, at which point everything unfolds almost exactly as after a heart lead. The only difference is West can cash a club, so it will have to be a diamond that is discarded if ♠K is accessed. AND FINALLY
- 4) SPADE For heaven's sake, folks, what TOOK you so long? This lead ticks all the boxes for putting 4♥ in dire peril. East wins the trick (thus blocking the spade suit) and switches to his stiff diamond, West covering declarer's Ten-or-Jack. This attack forces South to win ◆A right away, because trumps are still out if not West continues with the other

(i) produces a brutal ruff, which not only gives EW the first three tricks; but also (ii) blasts ◆A out of dummy, destroying the entry to ♠K and leaving South with a loser. So if you picked a spade, Well Done – you're in the running for a big reward !!

Yes but HA-HA-HA no you don't get it. Bridge can be cruel. Here's how cruel – Renata is approximately the nicest person in the world, but look at what she will do to you now. How do I know? Because at our table the opening leader DID somehow manage to fish out a spade – perhaps thinking his ♥J might hold potential for a trump promotion -- and this is what she did to THAT inspired foe, so expect the same

East accurately won A (largely for the same reasons as in the other variations), and promptly returned his stiff diamond. Probably when his partner's I first hit the table, East regarded it as a big favorite to be a singleton -- but when Renata contributed an honor that looked far less likely, since if she had been dealt QJx the falsecard might cost her a crucial trick in the suit. Anyway even if she HAD falsecarded, spades no longer looked like a threat and meanwhile West might well want a diamond through declarer's holding. In any case the priority was to dislodge A from dummy ASAP, as that spade lead might be a doubleton.

Renata was thus forced to win •A right away, and now it looks as if the game is "up against the wall". She soon demonstrated, however, that things were nowhere near as dismal as they seemed – there is fey magic in long suits, and she proceeded to run all six trumps to produce the five-card endgame seen just below, with EW having very accurately discarded to their best advantage:



Next she cashed ♠Q, confident (based on the lead of the 8-spot) that this would exhaust West of that suit. Now came the coup de grace – she played ♣A followed by ♣J, and the defenders were helpless. If the trick is won by West, declarer will soon score a diamond for the tenth trick. Meanwhile if East overtakes ♣Q he can just cash one more club for the third defensive trick – but then his last card is a spade (which he had been forced to retain, as otherwise South could have overtaken ♠Q in dummy and cashed ♠6) and much to his chagrin he is impotently

obliged at the finish to resurrect the long 'inaccessible' ♠K from la mort. Thus game was made mainly via a stepping-stone squeeze against East -combined with a secondary losing EW option, a throw-in against West. Double stepping-stone? Stepping-stone/throw-in hybrid? Who cares?

Those with sharp memories – and if you don't have one, you are always welcome at my table - may be wondering something like: "All well and good, and Bravo Heroine, but didn't you say something about returning to our ballots in reply to those two questions which started this allegedly 'interactive' article? It seems I say this far too often, but CAN'T IT BE ABOUT ME NOW?" Oh yes, and thank you very much for reminding me. There is indeed a good deal more to be said about this deal, and it all goes back to those two prefatory queries that I posed fifty or sixty pages ago. The issue we still need to consider is whether the defense were simply doomed from the start that is, was the 4♥ contract always cold? To resolve this final aspect of the board, let's see how other answers would have fared than the ones arrived at by our table opponents. First we look at the bidding:

- (A) Suppose you PASSED instead of opening 2 ◆ Now you have a live chance to beat 4 ♥, but you are on the honor system, because you (and partner) are going to have to do several other things correctly too. These include NOT overcalling when RHO opens 1 ♥ in fourth seat, and NOT leading a diamond honor, and both of you defending optimally throughout. Most important is NOT "squealing" on the diamond layout in any way, as that is how South knew in many of the variations NOT to win ◆ A immediately when the suit is first led by East. If you honestly would do all of this, then congratulations you are not dead yet.
- (B) Suppose you found a different lead (i.e. after opening 2♦) Wait, WHAT? Didn't we go through all the options and find them all inadequate? Oh no indeed. We sneakily glossed right over a LOW diamond -- how do you reckon South will play the hand in THAT scenario? Short story (who me?) even shorter, she will have to decide which is more likely: (i) You would open a vulnerable weak two with a truly horrible suit; versus (b) You would lead a low diamond from KQxxxx. It is likely enough, though very far from certain, that she will play you for the badsuit and ♣A (probably with a club card especially if you are a known or suspected Credo-Libido-Bandito. In that case up will go ♣A, and down will go 4♥.

So what is wrong with you lot? Why didn't you lead a small diamond? Why didn't you pass as Dealer? Oh some of you say you WOULD have led a small diamond? Some others say you DID pass, and then did everything else right? Brilliant!! But too bad!! You are still dead – over Renata's 3♥ balance, I just bid 3NT. Better luck next time, sports – you're bound to win a round of 13-card monte eventually.

This raised their level and they started to look for international tournaments like Pula, Venice and the story I want to tell you is from the 2005 second open European championship in Tenerife. Joro and his friend were playing in the open pairs and at one point they were playing a board against the great champion Alfredo Versace. No one of them had any idea who he was.

After bidding action with lot of strange bids and hesitations (at that moment they had no idea what is this) they reached in competitive action to level 5 doubled contract. No surprisingly director was called. The start of the play was also weird as the lead was in suit where in dummy there was AQxxx opposite xx in hand and the A was played catching singleton king. I don't remember if the contract was made or was good save but the result was top for Joro.

At that moment he didn't know that calling director is not accusation for cheating and opponents just protect their rights but there was discussion at the table. Then Joro who was very intelligent person said to Alfredo "Come my friend, I have to show you something which

may help you understand the crazy things we just did".

They walked together couple of meters to the wall with the standings and Joro said "look we are very easy to find". They were last from the hundreds of pairs. With smile on his face Alfredo said "I thing this really explains everything". They shaked hands and continue the play.

Playing for money is the best school and the results for Joro came sooner then even he expected, Second place in extremely strong teams tournament in Venice(won by Mirolio team with the champions from Tenerife Kovalski Tushinski, and all the elite Italian players, In his first visit to Pula we won the BAM event. The cherry was wining Pula open pairs (300+) in 2009.

Many years ago he was diagnosed with lungs cancer and despite the fact that I am living in Zagreb and he in Sofia we were still very close friends. He told me not to tell anyone, not even wanted to worry his kids. He was doing well until one month ago and has a plan to come for the tournament here in Pula but he lost the fight from extremely fast complications.

The entries are 25 euro/play/day for all main events. (e.g. BAM teams 100 euro per team, Mixed pairs 25 euro per player, and Open teams 200 euro/team since it is a 2-3 day event). Legends Carved in Stone and Myth

The Giants of the Mirna Valley



Istria's dramatic landscape has long inspired tales of beings larger than life. In the Mirna Valley, where rolling hills meet fertile plains, local legend speaks of giants who once roamed the land. Among them was Dragonja, a powerful figure said to have carved out rivers and valleys with his plow. The story goes that, with every pull of his mighty tool, rivers like the Dragonja and Mirna were born, their winding courses reflecting the slow, heavy strides of their maker.

The giants, according to folklore, built villages stone by stone, shaping not only the land but also the human settlements that would later flourish there. The town of Hum, today celebrated as the "smallest town in the world," is believed to be a leftover fragment of the giants' handiwork. As the story tells it, the giants began constructing great fortresses and cities, but when their task was nearly finished, they abandoned the smallest of them, leaving Hum behind as a living relic of their existence.

These tales aren't just fanciful stories for children—they are expressions of how early Istrians tried to explain the grandeur of their surroundings. The massive stone walls, hilltop fortresses, and river valleys seemed too monumental to be the work of mere humans. For villagers gazing at the vast Mirna plain, it felt natural to imagine that only giants could have sculpted such a world.

The Vampire of Kringa

While the giants of Mirna symbolize strength and creation, the legend of Jure Grando embodies Istria's darker side. Born in the small village of Kringa in the 16th century, Jure lived an ordinary life until his death in 1656. But, as locals tell it, death was not the end for him.

For sixteen years after his burial, Jure was believed to rise from his grave each night as a štrigon—a vampire-like creature from Istrian folklore. Villagers recounted terrifying encounters: Grando would knock on the doors of homes, and soon after, someone inside would die. He was also said to appear at the window of his widow, tormenting her with his presence long after his passing.

Fear gripped Kringa until, in 1672, the parish priest, accompanied by brave villagers, confronted the revenant at the cemetery. They opened his grave, finding his body eerily intact. After prayers and rituals failed to banish him, the villagers resorted to decapitation. With the strike of an axe, the štrigon was finally silenced, bringing relief to the community.

This chilling tale is often referred to as the first documented case of vampirism in Europe, predating the likes of Dracula by centuries. It was recorded by Austrian chroniclers of the time and later inspired a number of literary works and local traditions. Today, Kringa embraces its eerie fame—cafés serve "vampire drinks," and tourists come to hear the story that places this quiet Istrian village firmly on the map of European folklore.

Myth and Identity

Together, the legends of the giants and of Jure Grando form two poles of Istria's mythical imagination: one tied to creation and endurance, the other to fear and the supernatural. Both reflect the deep connection between people, their landscape, and their collective memory. Giants gave meaning to the rolling valleys and stone towns, while the štrigon embodied the darker mysteries of death and the unknown.

Even today, these stories live on—not only as tourist curiosities but as part of Istria's cultural fabric, whispered reminders that behind every hill and village lies a tale waiting to be retold.

Restaurant Kuglana

The closest restaurant to the venue, maybe 50 meters, between Histria and Park Plaza Verudela, right across the Histria Wing hotel. Lot of various dishes, from as simple as ham and eggs and pizza to Istrian and Croatian specialities. It is not expensive and you can get a decent dish for 15-20 euro. They usually do not take bookings as it is always crowded anyway. They also serve breakfast





Restaurant Boschetto

Very nice, friendly place near the tennis courts, 500 meters from the venue. Decent food and reasonable prices. This restaurant will probably host us for Madhatter's Karaoke Party. They will stay open every day until there are guests (2 a.m.). So this is the place to go after the tournaments for dinner or drinks. Most of other places around close at 11 or 12.

Restaurant Yacht Club

Only about 100 meters from the venue, down on the sea shore, one of Croatia best fish restaurants with breath-taking views. During the day you can also have a snack or just a cocktail and enjoy.

Reasonably priced for a restaurant of this level. For a bigger groups (especially in the evenings), booking is recommended.





Ribarska koliba

This is a famous fish restaurant about 20 minutes walk from the venue, in marina. You can see Ribarska koliba from windows of the main playing room. It is rather expensive and booking is usually required. Michelin Guide's Point Of View: This restaurant in the Ribarska Koliba Resort is situated near the Marina Veruda which can be admired through the large picture windows or from the restaurant's attractive terrace. Delicious Mediterranean cuisine takes pride of place on the menu, ranging from pasta-based starters to fish and seafood dishes made from the freshest ingredients, although a few meat-based specialities also feature.

Konoba Volme

This place is a bit further away, in Banjole, but it is worth visiting. It is a very nice restaurant with big terrace, very local and homey. Food is authentic Croatian, delicious and prices are in a lower range. You will need a car to get there. To make sure you get your table make a reservation +385 (98) 818265.



Restaurant Batelina (Gaultmillau review)



Restaurant Batelina is actually an old tavern in Banjole, a small town near Pula. It is not particularly decorated, nor does it have any advantages such as a garden, a special view or an interesting interior design, yet it is incredibly popular and it is very difficult to get a reservation. The first reason is the always fresh fish and seafood, but also the reduced working hours. An additional reason is certainly their famous chef David Skoko, a cook that appears almost every day on TV. Although he does not cook at Batelina on a daily basis, he is the one who creates the menu. The appetizers are varied and they serve 6 or 7 of them in small bowls or little plates:

marinated sardines, sardines in savor (fried and marinated), sea bass ceviche, pickled vegetables, salads... Our favourite was the grancigula, a delicious crab that is harder to find in restaurants these days. All dishes are based on a traditional and simple method of preparation. First of all, there are raw or grilled scampi, as well as various fish, depending on the day's catch, but also traditional cuttlefish brodetto, squid noodles with fried onions, which are definitely to recommend. If you expect top-quality dishes, prepared with imaginative culinary techniques, paired with wines, and all this in an elegant space – well, you won't find it here. Rather, we would say that Batelina is a tavern of "raw passions", basic, simple and traditional. Important notice: in Batelina they don't accept credit cards.


Sophia, Grand Hotel Brioni

Named after Sophia Loren who was frequent visitor of Brioni islands as a guest of ex-Yu president Josip Broz Tito, this place is a real gem.

Sophia restaurant is a premium meat specialist. Dine on the highest quality matured cuts of beef, including favourites like classic American steaks, but also local like Istrian Boskarin.

The atmosphere of this restaurant quickly puts a spell on their guests. Subdued lighting and darker color scheme create a mood that invites them to lower their guard and simply let the restaurant's specialties sweep them away. Expensive, but worth it.






